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COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Okay. Good evening, everyone. It's 6:01 p.m. Commissioner Meares will not be in attendance. Commissioner Brooks will not be in attendance. However, we do have a quorum.

So, it is 6:01 p.m. And I will start -- call to order the special meeting of January 26th, 2023. This meeting is for consideration and vote on a recommendation from Chief Karl Jacobson to terminate Officer Monique Moore, Internal Affairs Investigations 21I-076.

For the record, in attendance, myself, Commissioner Ribeiro, we have Commissioner Isaias Miranda, Commissioner Mike Lawlor and Commissioner Donald Walker. So, we do have a quorum in order to proceed with this hearing.

What I would just like to do first, I just want to make sure that the attorneys are here and the union are here so we can with the attorney who is representing the police department. If you can just identify yourself for the record to let us know that you are here.

ATTY. DUGAS: Yes. Good evening, Commissioners. Attorney Floyd Dugas from the law firm Bercham Moses representing the administration.

COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Okay, thank you. And for

the union, if the attorney can identify himself for 1 2 the record. 3 ATTY. SEGAR: Yes. Good evening, Commissioner. 4 Attorney Marshall Segar for Elm City Local. 5 COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Okay. Okay. And so 6 before we move into the proceedings I just want to 7 ask, is this meeting -- will be in closed or open session? 8 9 ATTY. SEGAR: Closed, please. 10 COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Commissioners, do you --11 you have heard the request for a closed session. 12 What is your pleasure? The motion to go into 13 executive session. 14 COMMISSIONER MIRANDA: Madam Chair, I'll -- I'll 15 move that motion. And I also want to point out that 16 Commissioner Brooks is with us. 17 COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Oh, he did show. Okay. 18 Okay. We have a mo --19 COMMISSIONER LAWLOR: I'll second -- I'll second 20 that motion, Madam Chair. 21 COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Okay. All right. Any 22 discussion? 23 COMMISSIONER WALKER: Aye. 24 COMMISSIONER RIBIERO: Okay. All those in favor 25 of the motion to go into executive session to discuss

PRESIDENT COTTO: Madam Chair, --14 15 COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Yes. 16 PRESIDENT COTTO: -- myself, the president, as 17 well as the vice president, Jonathan Lambe. 18 COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Okay. Attorney Segar, my 19 apologies. I actually should have asked before going 20 to executive session. Do you have any witnesses that 21 you will present because we need to have them sworn 22 in on the record. You are on mute. 23 ATTY. SEGAR: I haven't had a discussion with 24 Attorney Dugas regarding the process for this 25 evening. I don't know if this is going to be direct

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1 COMMISSIONER RIBIRO: You are welcome.

> COMMISSIONER LAWLOR: Madam Chair, I just have a question.

> > COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Yes.

COMMISSIONER LAWLOR: So, these three individuals that just swore to the tell the truth, but it's my understanding once we go into a closed session there is no record at all being kept of what is being testified to. Is that true?

COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Correct.

COMMISSIONER LAWLOR: So, I just don't -- I -- I know I said this once before. Perhaps, Attorney Duprey can help out here. But if no record at all is being create -- created for what is being said in a closed session, first of all, I don't know what the value of swearing people in is because how you would prove they said whatever you think they might have said based on a recollection is -- is pointless. And I do think that these closed sessions should be -- a record should be kept of them. There should be a transcript. And that can be sealed, right. because going forward -- at least it was my experience in the last couple of times. I -- people said things that I thought were maybe not true. And how one would establish that they had said those

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things under oath is beyond me.

So, I -- I guess my question is what's the purpose of taking an oath if there's going to be no record of what's being said?

ATTY. DUGAS: If I may, Commissioner? COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Yes.

ATTY. DUAGAS: I -- I think the purpose is to get -- you know get a -- a commitment and ensure, if you will, that they promise to tell the truth, understanding that without a transcript it would be difficult to prosecute somebody for perjury, but I don't -- I don't think that's the spirit of -- of what we are trying to do here. We are trying to, you know, give you -- give you all a flavor, in addition to the documents, of what happened so you can make an informed decision.

So, I don't see that it's critical. Although, it's an interesting question you raise and one we can certainly talk about for future hearings.

COMMISSIONER LAWLOR: And I only say that because every other thing we've got, like there's extensive documentation and transcript of who said what and when, and -- and -- and, you know, this will be the moment where people can rebut that or reaffirm or whatever, and -- and it's lost to history. And I

1 mean I don't --

What is the down side of having a record of what we're about to do? You know, it doesn't have to be public. It's just just in case someone makes an assertion that's completely contradicted by the facts with the intent to mislead us.

Why not make a record of it? I mean it could easily be recorded here without a problem. And then that recording could be secured just like 9,000 other recordings that are done by the police department. I -- I don't understand why not.

And especially, on top of that, depending on the outcome, there might be an appeal. So, someone is going to have to figure out was there a basis for terminating the individual in this particular case.

ATTY. DUAGS: All right. Well, the -- the appeal would be a grievance to the State Board of Mediation and Arbitration. And it's a de novo hearing, if you would. So, you know, I -- I don't see that -- you know, frankly, employers in the public sector fire employees all the time without having to go through this level of due process first.

So, I don't see it as an impediment. And I see that as, you know, a de novo hearing. And, you know, with all due respect, I'm not sure an arbitrator is

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going to be concerned, you know, in detail with -with -- with your thought and your analysis, just what your ultimate outcome was.

COMMISSIONER LAWLOR: Well, but, but the thing is evidence is being presented here which might be relevant evidence to be presented at a -- at a de novo hearing, right? I mean I'm just saying like this is the only part of this entire process for which there won't be a record which to me makes no sense. It doesn't -- again, it doesn't have to be public. It just can be preserved.

ATTY. DUGAS: Yeah. I think we'd have to look at -- and I would defer to Attorney Duprey on this and -- and -- and her office. But we have to think about because you are not allowed to keep minutes of an executive session which is what this is. Although, I can think of other circumstances in which we've had a transcription, for example, a student expulsion hearing. And I -- somehow we -- we -- we allow that to happen. So, we'll just have to figure out how to do it and make sure we are not running afoul of FOIA.

ATTY. LAWLOR: Yeah, I -- I'd feel more comfortable if we did that and so ...

ATTY. DUPREY: I will talk to Catherine Lamar

who is our Freedom of Information attorney. 1 2 is standard practice at the city that execution 3 session is not recorded. And so that's -- that's 4 been our practice. And so I'll -- I'll raise it tomorrow with -- for future -- future hearings. 5 6 COMMISSIONER LAWLOR: Okay. 7 COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: Okay. Are -- are we or 8 least satisfied for the moment, the discussion, 9 Commissioner Lawlor? 10 COMMISSIONER LAWLOR: Yes, yes. 11 COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: All right, thank you. 12 Thank you for raising that important issue. Okay. 13 With that being said, we already had a motion to move 14 into executive session. 15 So, we will do that now inviting the 16 commissioners, Chief Jacobson, Chief Ettienne, the 17 attorneys, Attorney Dugas, Attorney Segar, Attorney 18 Duprey, CAO Rush-Kittle, Officer Moore, Sergeant 19 Canning, the union president and vice president, 20 Cotto and Lambe. And I think that should be 21 everyone. Oh, I'm sorry. I thought Lieutenant 22 Colon, my apologies. Okay. 23 (Whereupon, the Board went into executive session at 24 6:14 p.m.) COMMISSIONER RIBEIRO: I don't think it gave us 25
