Workforce

- The labor force now exceeds 2019 (323,000 v. 320,000)
- Unemployment is slightly higher (3.9% v. 3.6% LMA)
- In the CEDS Business Survey, all sectors stated a need for skilled workers
- Scarcity of workers is resulting in a dramatic increase in wages
- Workforce Alliance is offering programs but is having difficulty finding participants

- State's First Time Homebuyer Program










Infrastructure
